
#### A Book and Movie Launch

#### **GETTING TO YES**

In the May/Jun 2024 issue of the FAA Safety Briefing, I reviewed some fatal accidents where either a mental health diagnosis and/or drug (some illicit) contributed. These were examples of why we do not authorize some diagnoses and treatments for flying.

Now I would like to review what we have done over the past decades to allow more pilots with formerly disqualifying conditions to fly (after appropriate evaluation and treatment).

Before we do that, recall that the FAA medical examination can differ from a clinical evaluation. The FAA exam is more akin to an occupational exam. Our goal is to determine if someone can safely operate in the National Airspace System (NAS). As such, we sometimes ask for testing, which would not be requested for routine clinical management. We also do not allow some treatment options, which may adversely impact aviation safety.

Long ago, the professional aviation community recognized that alcohol abuse was a significant safety issue; however, it was often hidden due to concerns that disclosure was career-ending. In the 1970s, the FAA, industry, and the unions collaborated to develop the current HIMS (Human Intervention Motivational Study) program. FYI, the program was purposely called HIMS to avoid any negative attention since it was designed to return pilots to the cockpit despite a known substance abuse disorder once in satisfactory recovery. To date, thousands of pilots have successfully been treated, monitored, and

returned to both the flight deck and sobriety. The 85% success rate is among the highest of similar programs.



Significant cardiac disease was once a permanent grounding item. If you had a heart attack, you could not fly again as a crew member. Since the early 1980s, coronary bypass graft surgeries, balloon angioplasty, stenting, and valve replacement have become almost routine, and thousands of pilots with these procedures have been returned to flight status. We convene a team of cardiologists to review these cases on a regular basis. We often request additional testing, but remember, we are not evaluating just your clinical care, but the risk to aviation safety.

Insulin-treated diabetes mellitus was also permanently disqualifying for many years. Both a low blood sugar and one too high can impair cognition. In the 1980s, the FAA first authorized non-insulin treatment of diabetes for pilots. In 1996, the FAA approved a protocol for the use of insulin by pilots holding a Class III medical. Technology continued to advance, and the FAA began authorization of insulintreated pilots with diabetes for Class I and II medical certificates in 2019 if they demonstrate excellent control. To date, more than 250 pilots have been authorized for a Class I or II medical despite using insulin to control their diabetes.

ADHD, attention deficit hyperactivity disorder, is a diagnosis seen much more frequently now than a few decades ago. Some of this is due to better recognition; unfortunately, some is due to overdiagnosis. We have recently looked at our records of those with this diagnosis and the outcomes of the evaluations that we required. As a result, we have been able to institute a fast-track pathway to more rapid approval for those who are off medications and have functioned well (such as occupational or academic success without accommodation) for at least four years.

Depression and the use of anti-depressants have been particularly challenging for the FAA to approve. Why? Both the medications and the underlying diagnosis can impair executive functions such as problem-solving and decision-making. In other

words, both can impair one's ability to recognize selfimpairment. After careful research and discussion, we authorized four SSRIs (selective serotonin reuptake inhibitors) under a specific protocol in 2010. This year, we have added an additional four medications as acceptable treatments of depression and anxiety.

While we cannot approve everyone, we have steadily increased the number of conditions that we can approve after appropriate evaluation and treatment. Both the treatment and condition must be aeroprogram has been very successful. Over the past medically acceptable; this has been and will remain challenging. Nonetheless, we will continue our efforts to get to "yes" when it is safe to do so.

#### Medical Certification Policy Updates By Judith Frazier, MD, MBA

Reprinted with permission from the Federal Air Surgeon's Medical Bulletin, Volume 59, Number 1, dated 06/20/24. Dr. Frazier is the Manager of the Policy and Standards Branch in the Office of Aerospace Medicine and is scheduled to give a presentation during the CAMA Annual Scientific Meeting in Jacksonville in September.

The Policy and Standards branch continues to focus on helping Aviation Medical Examiners (AMEs) more easily obtain the information needed to make a medical certification decision. This version highlights policy changes and updates published between November 2023 and May 2024. The full list of changes is hyperlinked in the Archives and Updates section of the AME Guide.

#### Psychiatry/Behavioral Health

Anxiety, Depression and Related Conditions introduced new disposition table and a new Decision Tool for the AME. Using this tool, AMEs may be able to issue a combination of up to two (2) behavioral health diagnoses when uncomplicated, treated with a single medication 2 years ago or longer.

If currently in psychotherapy and no medication, may also be issued using the Decision Tool. Remember to put the specific wording from the dispo table in Block 60 so we know you used the Decision Tool!

Expanded acceptable antidepressant medications (previous known as the SSRI protocol) to include EIGHT (8) medications of various classes (SSRI, SNRI, and NDRI).

Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) - revised the disposition table to allow ongoing psychotherapy.

#### Cardiac

Coronary Heart Disease (CHD) - Expanded disposition table added listing out initial certification requirements by class. Corresponding Protocol page added.

Recertification. Simplified the AASI CHD requirements for recertification for all classes by removing the annual stress test. If currently on an AASI for CHD/CAD, the RECERTIFICATION evaluation data is based on control of risk factors. Have the treating cardiologist complete the Coronary Heart Disease (CHD)/ Coronary Artery Disease (CAD) Recertification Status Summary. Please let your pilots know about this new change as we started to update their authorization letters!

If risk factors are not controlled, a stress test may be required. If currently on a SI, the CHD/CAD Recertification Status Summary should also be submitted to expedite recertification along with any stress testing requested per the authorization letter.

Atrial Fibrillation (A-Fib)/A-Flutter - Simplified Status Summary to use for both Initial and Recertification. Rember to send in the clinic notes showing how the A-Fib/Flutter was diagnosed for INITIAL certification consideration.

**Chest Pain/Angina** – New disposition table.

**ECG/EKG** - Clarified a full 12-lead ECG is required. (1,2, or 6 leads are not acceptable). Must be 25mm/sec at 10 mV.

Hemoglobin A1c replaces a fasting blood sugar on multiple cardiac pages and protocols.

Pacemaker - Status Summary expands recertification based on Estimated Replacement Interval. Pilots can be issued an annual SI until the month prior to the ERI expiration which is typically 3-4 months of battery life remaining.

Valve repair and Valve replacement - simplified. Removed requirements for stress testing for all classes.

#### Otolaryngology (ENT)

**ENT** - Section updated. Expanded and updated disposition tables for both Middle Ear and Outer Ear.

**Cochlear implant** – new disposition table.

Vertigo - New or expanded disposition tables for vertigo conditions such as Benign Paroxysmal Positional Vertigo (BPPV), Labyrinthitis (Vestibular Neuritis, Viral labyrinthitis, Epidemic Vertigo, Acute Vestibulopathy), Meniere's Disease, Perilymph Fistula (PLF), Persistent postural Perceptual Dizziness (PPPD or 3PD) and Superior Semicircular Canal Dehiscence Syndrome (SSCDS).

#### Other Systems/Miscellaneous

**GI – Cholelithiasis.** Updated disposition table.

**Medical Certificate Limitations -** Added reference to limitations by system.

**New Chiari Malformation Disposition Table.** Added caffeine use to social history the FAA Specifications for Neurologic Evaluation.

Ophthalmology - Lattice Degeneration. New disposition table.

#### **Pharmaceuticals**

Pharmaceuticals – Weight Loss Management Medications added as CACI. New Weight Loss Management Status Report (to use with CACI or SI). Clarified Loperamide should not be used for acute illness.

who flew 45 combat missions in

the F-105. Shot down in 1966, he was captured and spent 2,373 days as a POW in North Vietnam. While a prisoner, he decided to study medicine when he returned home. Upon his release in 1973, he attended Emory University School of Medicine, graduating in 1978, and completed residencies in both Family Practice and Aerospace Medicine.

Dr. McNish spent the remainder of his distinguished military career as one of a select few Pilot Physicians (practicing flight surgeons and combat ready fighter pilots) in the Air Force, flying T-38s and A-10s. Advancing to the rank of Colonel, he served as Hospital Commander at Myrtle Beach AFB and Holloman AFB. He proudly led the mission to Iraq at the end of Desert Storm in 1991 to medically evaluate and repatriate our returning POWs. Col. McNish ended his military career as Command Flight Surgeon for the AF Reserve in the Surgeon General's office at the Pentagon.

After his 30-year AF career, he joined Biodynamic Research Corporation (BRC) in San Antonio, TX, as a Consultant and Partner where he utilized his vast engineering and medical background. While at BRC worked on many high-profile investigations including the Space Shuttle Columbia disaster, the September 11th crash of Flight 93 in Pennsylvania, and the Daytona 500 crash that took the life of Dale Earnhardt.

Tom McNish, MD, COL (ret) Those who knew him will remember his wit, USAF, passed away at home patience, diplomacy, judgment, character and his July 19, surrounded by his loving careful analysis and synthesis of any problem. His and dedication to duty was legendary and he never failed complicated illness. He was born to make any situation he was involved in better after in Madison, TN, in 1942 to Mary his contribution. He was a wise and gentle man and Elenora and Edgar McNish and a consensus builder. Tom was a wonderful was a 1964 graduate of the combination of warrior and diplomat who loved his country unconditionally.

Tom was a Vietnam War Veteran Col. McNish was awarded three silver stars, the Legion of Merit, three Bronze stars with the "V" device, two Purple Hearts, five Air Medals, and the Air Force Commendation Medal.

> Tom loved his family more than anything and is survived by his cherished wife Yona, their three children, Lori (Wes), Amy (Tim) and Tommy (Jessi), nine grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.


> Burial services will take place at his childhood home in North Carolina. A celebration of life will be held in San Antonio at a yet-to-be-determined date.

#### **Aviation Medical Examiner (AME) Designee Information**

An Aviation Medical Examiner (AME) serves the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) and the flying community by medically certifying pilots. Each pilot is required to meet specific medical standards depending on the class of medical certificate for which the pilot applies. The FAA Regional Flight Surgeon (RFS) in your area is responsible for determining the current need for AMEs in their region.

If you are appointed by the RFS to become an AME, you are required to attend a week-long training seminar, typically conducted four times each year in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. This seminar is also known as the Basic AME Seminar.

After successfully completing the Basic AME seminar, subsequent training is required at three-year intervals. This training is available via our <u>AME Seminars</u> held at various locations in the United States. Some AME training can be completed on-line. Our AME training is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education and does meet your Continuing Medical Education (CME) requirements.


